

Guide to Physical Therapist Practice: A Critical Appraisal

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In virtually all physical therapy educational program today, it is standard procedure to teach, encourage, even require students to subject all sources of knowledge and information to critical appraisal, that is, to make judgments about the value of information based on assessing its source. However, in introducing the *Guide to Physical Therapist Practice* to students, we have found it difficult to encourage critical appraisal of the *Guide* for at least 2 reasons. First, the *Guide* itself contains few references and little discussion of the methods by which it was compiled. Second, we can point to no published intellectual or scientific attempts to critically appraise it. Nor do we see evidence that such a process of public critical appraisal is being planned. This article is an attempt to stimulate such discussion.

That said, we have neither the space nor, in truth, the expertise to set forth a comprehensive critique of the *Guide*. Instead, we will attempt to outline what we believe are some of the key issues that affect how we use and interpret the *Guide*, especially with reference to the chapters relevant to neurological physical therapy.

In attempting to critically appraise the *Guide*, our primary approach was to assess to what extent it achieves its stated goals to: 1) describe generally accepted physical therapist practice and to standardize terminology and 2) delineate "preferred practice patterns" *Guide*.¹ The first goal corresponds to Part One of the *Guide*, which defines a model or ideal of patient/client management. The second goal corresponds to Part Two, in which 3-4 practice patterns are presented in detail. A main conclusion of our appraisal will be that while Part One makes a strong conceptual statement about what physical therapists do and the way they do it, and Part Two fails to coherently apply the management model to different medical conditions.

PART ONE BUILDS A MODEL OF CLINICAL PRACTICE AROUND THE DISABLEMENT CONCEPT

Part One of the *Guide*, "A Description of Patient/Client Management," sets forth a description of physical therapy practice, as it is or as it should be, that is impressive in both its clarity and its forward-looking vision. Indeed, the Introduction to the *Guide* makes the following remarkable statement:

The *Guide* is based on a framework that rejects the medical model of disease (which emphasizes

"treating the diagnosis") and that focuses instead on the process of disablement — that is, on the impact of conditions on function.²

This framework, based on the Nagi model for classifying the disablement process,^{3,4} is the starting point for a novel conceptualization of what physical therapists do when they interact with patients. Five elements of patient/client management are described: examination, evaluation, diagnosis, prognosis, and intervention. The definitions and descriptions of these elements are generally lucid and precise and provide a clear sense of what should be involved in patient/client management by the physical therapist. An exception to this clarity, as we shall see, is in the discussion of diagnosis. Outcomes are described not only in terms of functional limitations and disability, but also, refreshingly, in terms of patient/client satisfaction and prevention. The description of 3 types of prevention — primary, secondary, and tertiary — is particularly cogent and will help physical therapists to better prepare themselves for this aspect of practice.

Part One Establishes a Common Terminology

In the course of describing the patient/client management model, the *Guide* establishes a common terminology that is generally successful in capturing the common sense interpretation of terms such as examination, history, and evaluation. In a few places, however, the *Guide* over reaches in trying to standardize terminology. For example, the *Guide* states that

Goals generally relate to the remediation ... of impairments, whereas outcomes relate to minimization of functional limitation, optimization of health status, prevention of disability, and optimization of patient/client satisfaction.^{5,6}

This attempted differentiation is clearly arbitrary and not very intuitive. In common usage, outcomes are the results or consequences of a process; they may be desirable or not. Goals are desired outcomes.

Nevertheless, despite rare misfires, Part One succeeds admirably in achieving the first goal of defining generally accepted physical therapist practice and establishing a standardized terminology. Indeed, we were pleasantly surprised to discover that it does not merely codify terminology. Part One establishes a model of practice that is contemporary and forward-looking and unflinching in discarding old ideas even when this might be unpopular in some quarters.

Part One Proposes an Ordered Set of Intervention Categories

Some of the strongest, and certainly the most surprising sections of the *Guide*, are the ones in which types of interventions are described. First, the distinction between intervention and direct treatment is made clear. Direct
