In inclusive classrooms, individualized approaches through Individual Behaviour Plans (IBPs) and collaboration among teachers, parents, and counsellors ensure effective support. Ethical and legal frameworks, including bans on corporal punishment and the Right to Education Act, stress dignity, fairness, and inclusion. Technology now assists in tracking and managing behaviour, but empathy and understanding remain central. Ultimately, behaviour management is about empowerment, not control, helping learners understand emotions, act responsibly, and thrive academically and socially in compassionate, inclusive environments.
